



Christian Faith in Action What The Gospel Tells Us

¹A few days later, when Jesus again entered Capernaum, the people heard that he had come home. ²So many gathered that there was no room left, not even outside the door, and he preached the word to them. ³Some men came, bringing to him a paralytic, carried by four of them. ⁴Since they could not get him to Jesus because of the crowd, they made an opening in the roof above Jesus and, after digging through it, lowered the mat the paralyzed man was lying on. ⁵When Jesus saw their faith, he said to the paralytic, "Son, your sins are forgiven." ⁹... 'Get up, take your mat and walk'...

Mark 2:1-5, 9b (parallel accounts in Matthew 9:1-8, Luke 5:17-26), New International Version (NIV)

This familiar story of Jesus' healing ministry should serve as a clear call for all those who engage in volunteer service and ministry. On this occasion, Jesus is visiting in a home in Capernaum. So many people wish to hear him speak and draw close to him that the house is full and long lines of people are waiting outside. There is a paralyzed man in town, and on this day four of his friends go to his home and carry him on his mat in the hope Jesus will heal him. When the four friends confront the long waiting lines they are not deterred. Knowing that they can't get to Jesus' healing presence through the door, they clamor onto the roof, dig through and lower their paralyzed friend to Jesus who heals the man, instructing him to "take your mat and walk."

The lessons of this story are both obvious and profound: Some people will never get to the healing presence without the voluntary assistance of others. Volunteers need to be resourceful and determined in order to overcome the obstacles that impede those they are trying to help. Most of all, it is their faith in Jesus and their belief that He can make all things new that motivates these volunteers to help their friend in need.
